



# How to Find a Low-Cost Dental Clinic

Finding affordable dental care can be challenging, especially if you do not have dental insurance. Fortunately, many communities across the United States offer low-cost dental services through community clinics, nonprofit organizations, and public health programs.

Knowing where to look can help you receive preventive care before dental problems become painful and expensive.

## Community Health Centers

Federally funded Community Health Centers provide dental services regardless of a person's ability to pay.

Many centers use a **sliding fee scale**, meaning the cost of care is based on your income and family size.

Dental services may include:

- Dental exams
- Professional cleanings
- Dental X-rays
- Fillings
- Tooth extractions
- Preventive care
- Oral health education

These clinics often serve patients with or without dental insurance.

## Dental Schools

Dental schools are another excellent option for affordable care.

Dental students provide treatment under the direct supervision of licensed dentists and faculty members.

Although appointments may take longer than in a private office, treatment costs are often significantly lower.

Services may include:

- Cleanings
  - Fillings
  - Crowns
  - Root canal treatment
  - Dentures
  - Periodontal care
- 

## Free Dental Clinics

Many nonprofit organizations and charitable programs organize free dental clinics throughout the year.

These events may provide:

- Dental examinations
- Cleanings
- Fillings
- Tooth extractions
- Emergency dental care

Some clinics require advance registration, while others accept patients on a first-come, first-served basis.

## Mobile Dental Clinics

Some communities operate mobile dental clinics that travel to schools, community centers, rural areas, and underserved neighborhoods.

These clinics help improve access to care for individuals who have transportation challenges or live far from dental offices.

---

## Ask About Sliding Fee Programs

When contacting a clinic, ask whether they offer a **sliding fee discount program**.

You may be asked to provide:

- Proof of income
- Identification
- Proof of address
- Household information

These programs can significantly reduce the cost of dental care.

---

## **Call 2-1-1**

In many parts of the United States, dialing **2-1-1** connects you with local community resources.

Operators may help you find:

- Free dental clinics
  - Low-cost dental providers
  - Community health centers
  - Emergency dental services
  - Financial assistance programs
- 

## **Contact Your Local Health Department**

State and local health departments often maintain lists of dental resources available in the community.

They may also provide information about:

- School-based dental programs
  - Community outreach events
  - Mobile dental clinics
  - Public assistance programs
- 

## **Do Not Wait for an Emergency**

Many dental problems become more expensive if treatment is delayed.

A small cavity may require only a simple filling, while untreated decay can eventually lead to infection, root canal treatment, or tooth extraction.

Seeking preventive care early is often the most affordable option.
