



# Interdental Brushes

## A Simple Tool for Cleaning Between Your Teeth

### What Are Interdental Brushes?

**Interdental brushes** are small, cone-shaped or cylindrical brushes designed to clean the spaces between teeth where a regular toothbrush cannot reach.

They are especially useful for removing dental plaque and food particles from larger spaces between teeth and around certain dental restorations.

Interdental brushes are an effective addition to daily oral hygiene but do **not** replace regular toothbrushing.

## Why Is Cleaning Between the Teeth Important?

Even if you brush carefully twice a day, your toothbrush cannot effectively clean every surface of your teeth.

Plaque commonly accumulates:

- Between teeth
- Around the gumline
- Around dental implants
- Under bridges
- Around orthodontic appliances

If plaque is not removed regularly, it may contribute to:

- Cavities
- Gum disease
- Bad breath
- Tartar (calculus) buildup

Cleaning between the teeth every day is an important part of preventive oral care.

# Who Can Benefit from Interdental Brushes?

Interdental brushes may be especially helpful for people who have:

- Larger spaces between teeth
- Gum recession
- Gum disease
- Dental implants
- Bridges
- Braces
- Crowns
- Fixed retainers

Your dentist can recommend the most appropriate size for your individual needs.

## How Do Interdental Brushes Work?

The small bristles gently clean the sides of adjacent teeth while removing plaque and food debris from between them.

Unlike regular toothbrushes, interdental brushes are specifically designed to reach areas that are otherwise difficult to clean.

---

## Choosing the Right Size

Interdental brushes are available in several sizes.

The brush should:

- Fit comfortably between the teeth
- Fill the space without force
- Move easily back and forth

A brush that is too large may damage the gums, while one that is too small may not clean effectively.

Some people require different brush sizes for different areas of the mouth.

# How to Use an Interdental Brush

## Step 1: Choose the Correct Size

Use the size recommended by your dentist or dental hygienist.

---

## Step 2: Insert the Brush Gently

Carefully place the brush between two teeth.

Do not force it into a space that is too small.

---

## Step 3: Move the Brush Back and Forth

Use gentle back-and-forth movements several times to remove plaque and food particles.

Avoid twisting or excessive pressure.

---

## Step 4: Repeat Throughout the Mouth

Clean all spaces where the brush fits comfortably.

---

## Step 5: Rinse the Brush

After use:

- Rinse the brush thoroughly with water.
  - Allow it to air dry.
  - Replace it when the bristles become worn or bent.

# Are Interdental Brushes Better Than Dental Floss?

It depends on the individual.

**Dental floss** is often the best choice for people with tight contact points between healthy teeth.

**Interdental brushes** may be more effective when:

- Spaces between teeth are larger.
- Gum recession is present.
- Braces or dental implants make flossing difficult.

Many people benefit from using whichever tool best fits their oral health needs.

## Can They Be Used Around Dental Implants?

Yes.

Interdental brushes are commonly recommended for cleaning around:

- Dental implants
- Implant-supported bridges
- Fixed dental prostheses

Using implant-safe brushes recommended by your dentist helps protect the surrounding tissues.

---

## Can Children Use Interdental Brushes?

Children wearing braces may benefit from interdental brushes because they help clean around brackets and wires.

Parents should supervise younger children until they can use the brushes safely and effectively.

---

# When Should You Replace an Interdental Brush?

Replace the brush when:

- Bristles become bent
- Bristles become worn
- The wire becomes damaged
- The brush no longer cleans effectively

Most brushes last several days to a few weeks, depending on frequency of use.

---

## Common Mistakes

Avoid:

- Using excessive force
- Using a brush that is too large
- Skipping areas with gum recession
- Reusing worn-out brushes for long periods

Gentle, consistent cleaning is more effective than aggressive brushing.

---

**"Interdental brushes are only for older adults."**

People of all ages may benefit, particularly those with braces, implants, or larger spaces between teeth.

**"If I use an interdental brush, I don't need to brush my teeth."**
